Discussions covered the need for security backup techniques. There were demonstrations of what happens when viruses get into your programs as well as a session on the legal aspects of the protection of information. The proceedings of the seminar have been published in a booklet "The First Port of Call in Computer Security and Backup" which is intended to be an essential computer-side reference book on the subject. Copies are available from ACADS-QLD.

Also in February, the Queensland region held an Executive lunch of ten engineers and systems managers on the topic "How best can ACADS serve the civil engineering Members of ACADS?". The round table discussion, lead by Melbourne based Councillor Ross Dutton (Davy McKee Pacific), canvassed the role of ACADS in the 1990's and the unique position that ACADS should fill in providing evaluations and information to members. A report with recommendations is being prepared for circulation and discussion by Federal Council.
